Cognitive	<p>Infants: <u>1, 2, 3 to the Zoo</u>; hide small toys under cloth; stacking, dangling, and rattling toys; “peek-a-boo”</p> <p>Toddlers: <u>Dinosaur Colors/Numbers</u>; dinosaur counting ; puzzles; kitchen items; shape sorter; busy ball popper</p> <p>Preschoolers: <u>Tyrannosaurus Math</u>; dinosaur word search and maze; dinosaur clothespin count; take home kits</p> <p>School Age Children: <u>Illustrated Encyclopedia of Dinosaurs</u>; dinosaur word search and maze; take-home kits</p>
Physical: Small & Large Motor	<p>Infants: Tummy time; mirror play; hold baby and dance to music; offer small toys to grasp; ball play</p> <p>Toddlers: Music & dance; dinosaur stomping; unit blocks; playdough; large crayons & paper; torn paper collage</p> <p>Preschoolers: Music & dance; dinosaur bone dig; dinosaur floor puzzle; manipulatives; open-ended crafts</p> <p>School Age Children: Dinosaur skeleton puzzle; Twister; Connect Four; Lego building; open-ended crafts</p>
Social	<p>Infants: <u>Who Does Baby See?</u>; peek-a-boo; face-to-face with other infants or adult; soft doll play; blow bubbles</p> <p>Toddlers: <u>Playing in the Valley</u>; tents and tunnel play; musical instruments parade; doll play; activity tower</p> <p>Preschoolers: <u>The Lost Dinosaur Bone</u>; doll house play; costumes; kitchen work; doing laundry; board games</p> <p>School Age Children: <u>We Don’t Eat Our Classmates</u>; board and card games; doll house play; finger puppets</p>
Emotional	<p>Infants: <u>Baby’s Feelings</u>; describe baby’s feelings; mirror facial expressions; encourage exploration and play</p> <p>Toddlers: <u>Moods and Emotions</u>; sing “When You’re (emotion) and You Know It”; sensory bottles; sand play</p> <p>Preschoolers: <u>How Do Dinosaurs Say Good Night</u>; butterfly breaths; “Dragon Hunt” yoga & T-Rex pose</p> <p>School Age Children: <u>Dinosaur Dream</u>; butterfly breaths; “Dragon Hunt” yoga & T-Rex pose; journaling</p>
